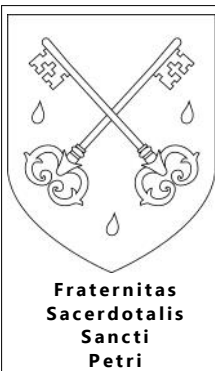

Twenty Fourth and Last Sunday After Pentecost

Today marks the last Sunday of the Liturgical Year. In the Gospel Our Lord Himself tells us “the stars will fall from heaven and the powers of heaven will be shaken.” Bible scholars are divided as to the object of Jesus’ words. Some hold they concern the end of the world while others say they apply to the destruction of Jerusalem which occurred in 70AD under Titus. However, the vast majority see that Our Lord speaks simultaneously of BOTH destructions since the severe chastisement of Jerusalem, which rejected its Messiah, is indeed a symbol of the eternal punishment which will be rendered to all people who have rejected their Divine Redeemer. Not a stone will be left upon a stone! What a dreadful sight of desolation of a temple once so beautifully and wonderfully adorned now in total disastrous ruin!

Before that day of judgement Our Lord tells of false prophets, false Christs, who will try to drag us away from the barque of Peter either by being too lenient or by pretending to be better than Christ’s Church. We certainly have an abundance of both kinds today all claiming to be of the Flock while rejecting the True Shepherd and His Church. The internet is full of these false prophets. Put down the mouse and pick up the beads! Our Lord also foretells of the celestial signs. For the ancients the stars were something unchangeable, constant, something stable that could always be relied upon. Now He could have been speaking literally here of the celestial stars and planets or He could also be speaking allegorically of the Natural Laws which were also something one could count on. Today we see that many of these “stars” have fallen in our nation. Who would have ever thought a nation would make the killing of an unborn child a “right”, or the tearing up of the family unit which started with Adam and Eve by a writ of divorce or, as we see in our nation today, two people of the same gender being “married”? The stars have fallen from the heavens!
Could this be the end? Are YOU ready?

HAPPY THANKSGIVING! THURS. NOV. 24th

The origin of this national holiday actually predates the United States of America. It was celebrated by the pilgrims of the Plymouth Bay Colony under Gov. William Bradford. The previous winter had been extremely



harsh in which 46 of the 102 pilgrims had died. With the help and friendship of the Wampanoag Indians, especially Squanto who taught the pilgrims where to fish, hunt and plant, they survived and even enjoyed a plentiful harvest in the year 1621. The Pilgrims therefore appropriately invited the Native Americans to celebrate a meal with them to thank God for the great harvest and His many blessings. How important for us to celebrate this national holiday and keep the tradition of thanking God for all His benefits! What better way to thank God than to come to the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass - the Eucharistic Feast—which goes back to the holiest Thanksgiving Feast ever, the Last Supper! Recall that the Greek word “Eucharist” actually means “Thanksgiving.” Be
