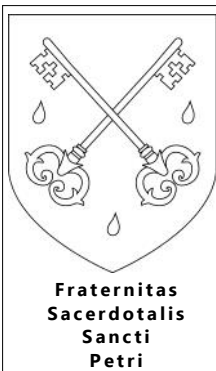

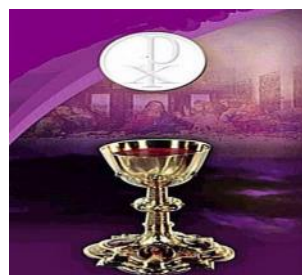

THIRD SUNDAY AFTER EASTER

On this Third Sunday After Easter we continue to rejoice in the Resurrection of Our Lord. However, The Gospel takes us back to Holy Thursday and the upper room.

Our Savior is about to face the ordeal of His passion which He as God knew to the minutest detail. Yet He forgets His own mental sufferings and devotes His last hours before His passion to strengthening and encouraging the disciples. We too are included in that all embracing Divine Love of Christ. He says to us as well "a little while and you shall not see Me ...you shall weep and lament and the world shall rejoice". How true in this post Christian era! It seems that evil is called good and good is called evil. However, this is when we must remember the second part of His prophesy "your sorrow shall be turned into joy...and your joy no one shall take from you." If we persevere through the dark hour of our trial, if we bear with our Good Friday, the Sun of Easter morning will shine upon us!

In the epistle, St. Peter tells us to abstain from carnal desires. Hopefully we have learned through Lenten penances how we are weak in certain things and how much we are attached to things of this earth. Let us not fall back but learn from this past Lent! St. Peter also exults us to : "Be subject therefore to every human creature for God's sake, whether to the king as supreme, or to governors as sent through him for vengeance on evildoers and for the praise of the good. For such is the will of God, that by doing good you should put to silence the ignorance of foolish men." There is no lack of foolish men! We see the turmoil in our country and in the world today. We should pray for our leaders in the state and in the Church remembering that they were put there by God and that like in the Old Testament WE GET THE LEADERS WE DESERVE!

Let us never forget that we as Christians are called on to carry our cross, to imitate our Master but also we have His Divine assurance that our crosses will be changed into crowns of eternal glory & that our earthly short lived sorrows will be turned into everlasting joy one day!

§ 8. THE FUNERAL OF INFANTS

INFANTS who die without baptism may not be buried with any liturgical ceremony. When baptized infants die under the age of reason (seven years), there is a special rite for their funeral.⁶ There are no signs of mourning; no prayers for the dead child are said. The colour is white. If the bells are rung at all they are rung joyfully. A crown of sweet-smelling flowers is put on the child's head as a sign of his bodily integrity and virginity.⁷

Holy Mother Church teaches us that baptism takes away not only original sin but for adults actual sin and the temporal punishment due to sins already confessed as well!! Yes! They would go straight to heaven!. So much more the infants who die after baptism yet having not reached the age of reason could not sin also go straight to heaven! To pray FOR them or to have a requiem Mass for them would indeed be a heresy against the Catholic faith! Yet the child certainly has taken a part of the hearts of the parents with them.
