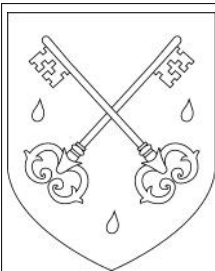

An Attitude of Gratitude—



"But where are the other nine?"

Today's gospel is the healing of the ten lepers. The Church's purpose in selecting this true event is two fold. We marvel at the infinite mercy of God who has compassion on all men regardless of race or creed. Samaritans were despised by the Jews. Yet Jesus heals him. How great He is and how much He loves us! Yet we also see in this event the depths of ingratitude we as human beings can sink. This story is not an isolated incident in the Gospels. Most of those who were miraculously cured by Jesus forgot to thank Him. However, in today's Gospel there was at least one man who came back with an attitude of gratitude. Only one man out of ten had the decency to express his gratitude for a new lease on life. Leprosy in those days was a hopeless death sentence! You immediately left your home without embracing loved ones and moved to the dreaded leprosy colony for the rest of your miserable life! Yet only one said THANK YOU! This moved Our Lord to commend him for this small act of thankfulness which was so graciously accepted. Are we like him or are we one of the nine who forget all about He who gave us new life?
